

After having served as a Professor at Miles Law School beginning in late summer of 2016, with his latest appointment effective June 1, 2019, Terry Price becomes the sixth dean in the school's history. Serving with distinction were previous Deans: J. Richet Pearson, George Jones, David Barnes - a Birmingham municipal court Judge, Ralph Cook - a former Alabama Supreme Court Justice, and Emory Anthony - a former Birmingham municipal court judge.

Dean Price's First Home:

He is a native of Dolomite, Alabama.

Dean Price Connects With Fairfield:

He completed elementary school at Robinson Elementary School in Fairfield, Alabama. Next, he attended what was then known as "Interurban Jr. High" - also in Fairfield. During his first year there, his father died after being injured while at work at a local plant.

Dean Price Connects With California and New York:

The next year after his father's death, his mother moved with him and his younger brother to Los Angeles, California ("CA").

He completed junior high at what is now named Johnnie L. Cochran Jr. Middle School (but was then named "Mount Vernon Jr. High"). There, Dean Price was skipped a semester. In the spring of 1971, He received his high school diploma from Los Angeles High School. There, he was also skipped a semester. In January, 1975, he received his college degree from Columbia College of Columbia University in New York City. He completed the degree requirements a full semester early. In 1978, he received his Juris Doctor from the University of California at Davis. After his first year of law school, the law school's then Dean (who had been his Contracts Law Professor) recommended him for a job in New York City, whereupon he spent that summer clerking for a law book publisher - Matthew Bender Publishing Company - in New York City. He edited and updated the company's Ohio Forms for Pleading and Practice. Towards the end of his second year of law school, he was selected for membership on the law school's law review. During that summer he was employed as the Citations Hearing Officer by the District Attorney of Alameda County, CA. During his third year of law school, he clerked and drafted opinions for a Yolo County, CA. Superior Court Judge - the late James C. McDermott.

Dean Price Finds It Hard To Walk Past A Bar Without Going In The Bar:

After taking the California Bar Examination in July of 1978, he returned to Birmingham where he then clerked for Adams, Baker and Clemon. Later that year, he began clerking for the United States Department of Labor's Office of the Solicitor ("DOL"), which then had an office in Birmingham. Just before the winter of 1978, he received notice that he had passed California's Bar Examination and he was then promoted to a position as Trial Attorney with the DOL. In February 1979, he passed Alabama's Bar Examination. Later (but while still employed by the DOL), he passed the District of

Columbia's Bar Examination which was offered the week after he completed training in DC for the de-centralization of ERISA enforcement.

In 1985, after being hired by Constangy Brooks & Smith - one of the nation's oldest and most prominent labor and employment law firms, he passed Georgia's Bar Examination. Shortly, thereafter, he became a partner in that law firm and began the firm's ERISA practice, working out of the Atlanta Office. He also handled and tried other federal employment law cases across the country.

Dean Price Returns Close To Home:

In 1996, he returned to Birmingham to become a shareholder in the labor & employment law firm that was immediately to become Lehr Middlebrooks Price & Proctor and began that firm's ERISA practice. He also handled and tried other employment law cases across the country.

In 2006, he became a partner in the then newly-opened Birmingham office of the Atlanta based labor and employment law firm of Ford & Harrison, LLP, where he handled and tried various employment law cases.

Since 2013, he has had his own labor and employment law practice.

Additionally, he has been admitted to practice before and has handled cases before (1) the Courts of Appeal for the Fifth, Eleventh and Sixth Circuits, as well as before (2) numerous federal district courts across the country and (3) one case in which the United States Supreme Court denied his opponent's cert request. Moreover, for the period from 2003 to 2019 Martindale-Hubble indicates that Dean Price's peer review rating has been AV Preeminent (scoring 5 out of 5).
